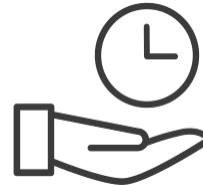

As applications are submitted, investment teams collaborate to ensure **each application is reviewed by all relevant teams**. This helps ensure all ideas are considered where they fit best.

Teams will thoroughly review applications against our investment criteria. At this stage, **teams may gather additional information from applicants**.

After the review stage, some applicants will be invited to interview. We see this as an opportunity to learn more about leaders, their teams, and their ideas. **You will be notified about your application status by March**.

Finally, we will make funding decisions based on what we learn throughout the review and interview process. While timing varies by investment area, **all applicants can expect to hear from us by the end of June**. Funding will be disbursed in the summer.

LEARNING SOLUTIONS

We will invest in learning solutions that accelerate K-8 reading and math growth. There is a critical need for innovation to increase access to **K-8 reading and math solutions that build foundational literacy and numeracy**, especially for students furthest from opportunity.

We're looking for **tools, content, and models focused on:**



K-8 Reading

Learning solutions that empower students to read and write, which is fundamental to their ability to learn across subject areas and communicate with others.



K-8 Math

Solutions aimed at building students' math abilities, from early math skills through algebraic thinking, enabling them to make sense of the world around them, analyze complex topics, and solve problems.

Within these areas, we're looking to address the following opportunities:

- Engaging and empowering students to build critical skills that set a foundation for learning and success.
- Supporting teachers and families to deliver grade-level and differentiated instruction that meet a range of student needs.

LEARNING DIFFERENCES

We will invest in innovations that **increase equitable outcomes for the 1 in 5 students with learning differences (diagnosed and undiagnosed)**, especially those experiencing the impacts of poverty and racism. Students with learning differences are entitled to a great education that allows them to thrive and excel — in and out of the classroom.

We will **integrate** a focus on learning differences into all investment areas, while making a small set of **direct investments in the following high-need areas**:



Professional development and instructional tools

Professional learning and related tools designed to accelerate an educator's ability to translate research into practice, create communities of belonging and improve outcomes for students with learning differences



Special education teacher recruitment and retention

Ideas that increase the number of highly qualified special education teachers in schools and improve retention rates by providing support throughout their careers



Postsecondary readiness solutions

Experiential learning opportunities and transition support services designed uniquely for students with learning differences as they move through high school and prepare for college and career

In Scope

IDEA

This section provides an opportunity for you to share **more details about your idea, mission, and vision**. This is the most important section of the application.



IMPACT

In this section, you'll describe **the anticipated impact of your work**. This helps us understand who you intend to serve, and how your idea has the potential to drive meaningful change for students and educators.



THEMES

This section helps us understand **how your idea aligns with our cross-cutting priorities**.



REVENUE

We would like to understand **how much money you have raised and/or earned in your previous and current fiscal year**. This includes fundraising, raised capital, and earned revenue, if applicable.



LEADERSHIP & TEAM

We hope to learn about you, including **what drives and inspires you and the skills and strengths you bring to the work**. We expect leaders to build diverse and capable teams with the right mix of skills and backgrounds to drive impact.



ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

This section **helps us gather useful information about our applicant pool. Many of these questions are optional** and will help us improve our recruitment efforts in the future. It will not impact our funding decision.



IDEA

This is the most important section of the application. It provides an opportunity for you to **share more about your idea, mission, and vision**. You'll articulate the long-term change your organization seeks to create, the problem you're addressing, and how your idea offers a solution.

KEY QUESTIONS

- Tell us about your idea: How does your solution address a key issue in U.S. K-12 education?
- Describe your approach to engaging community members – particularly students, educators and caregivers – to contribute to the development and design of your idea.
- [Optional] Please share a link to a product demo of your idea.
- Strong applications make a clear connection between the idea (what), the problem you seek to address (why), and the implementation plan (how).
- Clearly share the "how" behind your idea by going into as much depth about your program or product as you can.
- Ask someone who's less connected to your work to read your application for clarity.

IMPACT

In this section, you'll describe the expected impact of your work. This helps us understand who you intend to serve, and how your idea has the potential to drive meaningful change for students and educators.

KEY QUESTIONS

- How will you know if you are successful?
- How do you plan to expand your impact over time?
- Who do you primarily aim to serve?
- Your story of impact will look differently depending on the stage of your idea, and that is OK.
- Speak to what you hope will be true for students, educators, and/or caregivers engaging in your program in the next 12 months, if you receive funding.
- Share 3 to 5 specific qualitative or quantitative indicators that will help you assess your short-term impact on students, educators, and/or caregivers.
- Describe who you are currently reaching and where you are currently operating.

Launch Grants

2027

Planning Grants

If you plan to open a public charter or district school in 2027, you can submit an application after completing the eligibility form.

2028

Charter School Design Grants

If you plan to open a charter school in 2028, you can submit an application after completing the eligibility form. We are open to all applicants, and have an interest in supporting leaders who want to open a new charter school in partnership with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) through our [HBCU Charter School Design Fellowship](#).



WHO

We're looking for **diverse school founders who have a deep connection to the communities they serve**. Collectively, the mission-driven, innovative team brings skills in instruction, school management and school operations, demonstrating they are **capable of designing and launching an innovative PK-12 public school**.



HOW

We expect teams to **engage students, families and community members early and often to inform all aspects of design and planning**. Furthermore, teams must be able to turn their vision into reality. We look for **teams with a plan to achieve a successful school launch**, and evidence that a team is on track to realize a wide range of student outcome goals.

EDSS

1 Do charter schools have to be authorized by the application deadline?

Charter schools do not need to be authorized by the application deadline in order to move forward in the application process. However, we do take into account where in the authorization process teams are in relation to their launch year and any significant barriers to authorization before disbursing funding. We expect teams to have a clear plan for achieving this milestone and a strong understanding of their local context.

If you have not received authorization, it is highly unlikely that you will be on track to open in the 2026–27 school year. If that's the case for your school, a planning or design grant is likely a better fit for you. If you have not started the charter petition or authorization process at all, you are likely on the design track.

2 What autonomies do district schools need to be eligible for funding?

District schools must have autonomies in hiring, instructional design, and school management. These do not need to be formalized by the application timeline but should be secured before the school opens to receive additional funding. We do, however, require a letter of support from the district's superintendent or designee at the time of application to consider your school proposal for funding.

- A restart or consolidation of existing schools that were previously open
- Turnaround or redesigns of existing schools
- Schools within schools
- Centers that serve *only* Pre-K students
- Schools launching in Fall 2029 or later
- Charter school 2s that are not yet outperforming their local school district



Eligibility

Your eligibility will depend on **when** you plan to open the school and the **type of school** you plan to open.

Planning and Launch Grants **Fall 2026 or 2027**

- A first or second charter school in an emerging charter management organization (CMO)
- A new district school with a path to secure autonomies and superintendent/board approval
- A new tribal or BIE school

PLAN

- For example, tell us what steps you're taking to develop your instructional model, when you plan to make key hires, etc. These milestones should not just be operational
- We know opening a school is a difficult undertaking; share how you're aware of key blockers that exist generally and for your specific context as well as your plan for mitigating those risks



REVENUE

We would like to understand how much money you have raised since you began operating. As a funder of early-stage ideas, we understand and expect that many applicants have not yet raised funding.

HELPFUL TIPS

- Be transparent. Responses of "\$0" are acceptable and will not negatively impact your application.



IMPACT

We partner with leaders in the early stages of developing a new school model with the potential to dramatically improve student learning and advance equitable opportunity. **Our long-term goal is to have a catalytic impact on student success nationally**, so we fund teams that seek to expand their impact significantly over time.

Eligibility Charter School Design Grant

Focus

We fund leaders that are opening schools in the fall of 2028.



Eligible

- Enrolling students within the K-12 grade span on a full-time basis
- A new fully publicly-funded charter school that does not charge for students to attend
- Expansions or replications within established CMOs (only for partnership with HBCUs)



Ineligible

- District schools
- A restart or consolidation of existing schools that were previously open
- Turnaround or redesigns of existing schools
- Schools within schools
- Centers that serve *only* Pre-K students
- Schools launching in Fall 2026, Fall 2027, or Fall 2029 or later
- Charter school 2s that are not yet outperforming their local school district



Charter school design grants are open to aspiring charter school leaders who plan to open a new school in 2028.

1 Do I need an HBCU partner to be eligible for a charter school design grant?

No, a partnership with a Historically Black College or University (HBCU) is not required to be considered for a charter school design grant.

Our 2026 design grants are open to aspiring charter school leaders who plan to open a new school in 2028. While we are especially interested in supporting leaders who are developing schools in partnership with HBCUs, we also welcome applicants who are not pursuing this type of partnership.

2 Do I need to be a single-site founder (School 1) to be eligible for a charter school design grant??

No. Our charter school design grants are open to aspiring leaders planning to open a new single-site school in 2028, as well as to existing charter school leaders interested in developing new schools within their network in partnership with HBCUs. If you're an existing charter school or part of a network pursuing an HBCU partnership, you should complete the charter school design grant application.
